Coprinus micaceus - Mica Cap Inky

Daedalea quercina – Thick Maze Polypore

Daldina concentrica - Carbon Balls or Cramp Balls with concentric interior zones

Exidia glandulosa – Black Jelly

Flammulina velutipes – Velvet Foot (similar to G. marginata but with a <u>white</u> spore print) EDIBLE Galerina marginata – LBM formerly Galerina autumnalis (<u>brown</u> spore print) DEADLY POISON Ganoderma applanatum – Artist's Conk

Hypoxylon sp. – Black Crust

Lycogala epidendrum – Pepto-Bismol Slime or Wolf's Milk Slime; myxomycete not a fungus Lycoperdon perlatum – Pear-shaped Puffball; lignicolous (on wood) overwintered specimens Marasmius spp.

Morchella esculenta group – Yellow Morel (there are currently about a dozen species of morel mushrooms distinguished by morphology and supported by DNA analysis)

Mycena leaiana – Lady Lion; bright orange caps with emarginate gills (i.e. with deep orange edge) Mycena spp.

Peziza badio-confusa – distinguished from Peziza badia by roughened rather than ridged spores, vernal rather than autumnal fruiting season, and larger spores (Elliott and Kaufert, Can. J. Bot, 52, 1974)

Phaeocalicium polyporaeum – Fairy Pins in rows on Purple Tooth fruiting bodies

Phellinus gilvus – Tiger Eye Polypore (orange flesh stains black in KOH)

Pleurotus ostreatus – Oyster Mushroom (sometimes referred to as Elephant Ears)

Polyporus alveolaris – Honeycomb Polypore; orange with hexagonal pores, more or less sessile

Polyporus arcularis – Fringed Polypore like P. elegans but without black stipe

Polyporus elegans – Elegant Polypore or Little Black Foot with angular pores

Polyporus squamosus – Pheasant Back or Dryad's Saddle

Polyporus sulphureus – Sulphur Shelf or Chicken-of-the-Woods

Puccinia podophylli – May Apple Rust (orange patches on leaves of Podophyllum peltatum)

Schizophyllum commune - Split-Gill

Stereum ostrea – Common Log Leaves or False Turkey Tail (smooth underside)

Trametes elegans – Ambiguous Polypore formerly Daedaleopsis ambigua

Trametes versicolor – Turkey Tail (underside with minute pores)

Tremella sp. – Witch's Butter or Yellow Jelly; Tremella aurantia is most easily distinguished by its host preference, attacking the common wood rotter, <u>Stereum hirsutum</u>, while Tremella mesenterica parasitizes species of Peniophora, a resupinate fungus [mykoweb.com]

Trichaptum biforme – Purple Tooth

Xylaria sp. – Dead Man's Fingers
